## FEMA's 2022-2026 Strategic Plan

The 2022-2026 FEMA Strategic Plan outlines a bold vision and three ambitious goals designed to address key challenges the agency faces during a pivotal moment in the field of emergency management.

Wide-ranging and long-term, the goals defined in the plan respond to the changing landscape in which we find ourselves. While some activities in this plan can be quickly realized, some will require efforts through 2026.

The plan outlines three bold, ambitious goals to meet this challenge. These goals position FEMA to address the increasing range and complexity of disasters, support the diversity of communities we serve, and complement the nation's growing expectations of the emergency management community.

Emergency management is centered around people — those who work with FEMA and those who are served by the agency. The first objective in each goal focuses on the emergency management workforce, ensuring they are ready to support those served.

Underserved communities, as well as specific identity groups, often suffer disproportionately from disasters. As a result, disasters worsen inequities already present in society.

The second objective highlights how the agency can better support communities through FEMA programs.

The third and final objective centers around how FEMA policies, tools and programs, as well as collaboration with partners, can be leveraged to increase whole community outcomes in emergency management.

The goals and objectives laid out in the Strategic Plan will enable success for the agency, the emergency management field, and those who are served.

# Flooding After Fire May Be More Severe

Floods are the most common and costly natural hazard in the nation. And after a wildfire, the charred soil and burnt vegetation can lead to a bigger risk of flooding and mudflow for up to five years or more due to vegetation loss and soil exposure. Residents and businesses in areas recently affected by wildfires need to protect their physical and personal property with flood insurance.

Dangerous mudflows may occur when rainwater moves across barren ground, picking up soil and sediment and carrying it in a stream of floodwaters.

Flood damage after fire is often more severe and can lead to dangerous mudflows. A mudflow occurs when rainwater moves across barren ground, picking up soil and sediment and carrying it in a stream of floodwaters. No structure is immune to flooding, but with flood insurance, residents and business owners can be ready for nature's next test. It typically takes 30 days for a new NFIP flood



insurance policy to go into effect, so the time to buy flood insurance is now. Flood insurance can be the difference between recovery and financial devastation.

There's just no rest for the West. But at least residents can rest assured that they have flood insurance. We encourage people to protect the life they've built.
